The "Rooney Rule," which mandates that minority candidates be interviewed for head coaching positions in the NFL, is a step forward but has not yielded a significant increase in minority leadership roles (Lapchick, 2017).

Media plays a crucial role in shaping public perceptions of race and athletes. The portrayal of minority athletes often

perpetuates stereotypes, framing them in terms of physical prowess while downplaying intellectual or leadership qualities (Fink, 2016). This media bias can reinforce negative stereotypes and contribute to the racialization of sports (Burke & Fink, 2019). However, recent efforts by athletes to control their narratives, including social media activism, have shifted the discourse, enabling a broader representation of race and identity (Jackson, 2020).

#### 4. Race, Identity, and Social Movements in Sports

Professional sports have increasingly become a platform for athletes to advocate for racial justice. High-profile protests, such as Colin Kaepernick's kneeling during the national anthem, have sparked nationwide debates about race, police brutality, and inequality (Foster, 2018). A report by the Institute for Diversity and Ethics in Sport (TIDES) found that in 2020, Black coaches accounted for only 21% of head coaches in the NFL, despite Black players making up over 70% of the league (Lapchick, 2020). In the NBA, the numbers are slightly better, but the trend of underrepresentation in leadership roles is still prevalent (Walker, 2016).

#### 2. Stereotypes in Media Representation

Media representations of Black athletes often emphasize their physical attributes rather than intellectual or leadership qualities. Studies show that Black athletes are frequently depicted as naturally gifted or physically superior, while their white counterparts are often portrayed as hardworking, intelligent, and tactical (Fink, 2016). This racial stereotyping reinforces narrow perceptions of race and diminishes the complexity of individual identities.

#### 3. Athlete Activism and Social Change

The activism of athletes, particularly in the wake of events like George Floyd's murder, has become a critical aspect of the racial discourse in professional sports. Colin Kaepernick's protest against police brutality and the NBA's collective response to racial injustice exemplify the growing role of athletes in advocating for social change (Foster, 2018). These actions have spurred greater conversation about race, equality, and the responsibility of athletes to use their platforms for advocacy.

### Discussion

The racial representation of athletes in professional sports remains a critical issue, particularly in leadership roles and media portrayals.
